



1. Historic Garden I The Isokon Building I Concept, Masterplan & Visuals



Brief

The Isokon building, built in 1933 was the first Modernist block of flats in Britain. The challenge, to design a garden that is sympathetic to the design and history of the site. Develop areas that the residents can use to relax, work & create.

Concept

The front of the building has been designed as a modern parterre with large shard like infinity pools that flank the walkway leading to the entrance of the building. The pools act as a mirror, a fragmented reflection of the building which can be admired and enjoyed by those on the ground and from the floors above .

1. Historic Garden I Private Space I Concept, Masterplan & Visuals

Concept

A private penthouse sitting stop of the Isokon Building. The design is centered around spaces to relax and entertain in. Continuing the Palette of materials and muted Colours with the addition of Corten steel raised planters to cocoon the seating area. The bar areas has been located to look out over the nearby woodland as the sun sets in the west.

1. Historic Garden I Planting Concept, Plan & Palette

Concept

The planting has been chosen to create an informal scheme that compliments the strong architecture of the building. Grasses, and some carefully considered perennials in a mix of forms create softness against the strong lines of the hard landscaping. The building's pink sets the tone for the planting palette of muted tones of purple, pink, buff, bronze and russet.



2. Public Realm I Lewes Priory School Quad I Masterplan & Visuals

Brief

A holistic design that improves well being and mental health for staff & students. The challenge, the current school grounds only cater for a small proportion of the student & teacher needs.


Concept

The girls in the school had no where to sit, chat & relax. The solution was to create a curvilinear design immersed in nature with spaces for conversation in intimate settings.

Swing Islands for face-to-face conversation & movement. Circular Pergola with reflection pool & concentric seating area North perimeter raised beds – Small trees for screening & planting for seasonal planting

More intimate seating for quiet moments or secret conversations Semi-circular cantilevered seating 8 x interlocking raised garden beds (to 500mm) with benches, to rest amongst nature



2. Public Realm Wellbeing garden I Lewes Priory School Courtyard I Masterplan & Materials

Concept

With the teaching profession in crisis, retention and wellbeing of staff is more important than ever. The solution was to design a restorative wellbeing garden just for staff, with multiple zones for "connection". The reflective qualities and sounds of water play a crucial role in wellbeing, and so three unique water features have been incorporated in this small courtyard space.

The perimeter has been "greened-up", cocooning the seating areas and immersing the staff in nature. The planting and pergolas provide privacy from onlookers that surround the courtyard from all all sides and from above

3. Conceptual Garden

Brief & Concept

A global impact show garden was designed for the Hampton Court Palace garden Festival. The concept was a "Don't flush our future away". The journey begins in a thriving Caledonian pine forest of Scotland with a complex understory , an abrupt clearing of 12 toilets in "farmed" rows highlights the destruction caused to fulfill one person's lifetime consumption of toilet roll. The message is to switch to recycled toilet paper and save these old growth forests.







Reference image 1: Joint Detail


